The Centre des monuments nationaux also offers lecture tours at sites open to the public, such as the National Estate of Saint-Cloud and the Palais Royal, as well as tours of sites that are usually closed to the public, such as the July Column, the Hôtel de Sully, the Hôtel Potocki and the Fondation Marta-Pan - André Wogenscky.

NATIONAL ESTATE OF SAINT-CLOUD

The National Estate of Saint-Cloud, which once belonged to Philippe d'Orléans, younger brother of Louis XIV, lost its château to fire in 1870 but still boasts some 460 hectares of gardens, grounds and wooded areas representing one of the finest expressions of four centuries of the history of garden design.

JULY COLUMN

In 1830, the "Trois Glorieuses", the Three Glorious Days or the July Revolution, brought Louis-Philippe to power. In tribute to the victims and their struggle, he ordered the construction of a triumphal column topped with the Spirit of Freedom. The tour begins at the Hôtel de Sully and continues at the July Column, where you can visit the plinth. For safety reasons, the bronze spiral staircase leading to the top of the column is inaccessible to the public.

FONDATION MARTA PAN ANDRÉ WOGENSCKY

HÔTEL DE SULLY

Welcome to the Sully residence! Maximilien de Béthune, Duke of Sully (1559 - 1641), began building this private mansion near the Place Royale (now the Place des Vosges) in 1625. The building remained in the Sully family until the mid-17th century.

This architectural jewel in Paris' 8th arrondissement previously served as the head office of the Paris Ile-de-France Chamber of Commerce and Industry, which has decided to open the doors of this extraordinary building to the public.
